Love and Tolerance is Our Code

The darkness of alcoholism and drug addiction continues to ravage the lives of addicts, their families and really, all those with whom they come in contact. One addict at time, the darkness is lifted when the music of C.A. is shared and heard. The music of C.A. is played in the key of “service.” Service, in its purest form, is the activity in which a spirit awakened through recovery meets others in Fellowship.

When a candle is lit in a darkened room, the darkness disappears. In 1934, a candle was lit in the dark room that is alcoholism and drug addiction. Yet, the darkness is thick. In 1935, through 12th-Step service, Bill W. shared his light with Dr. Bob and the light strengthened. That light continued to be shared alcoholic to alcoholic until Cocaine Anonymous was born in 1982. Struggling to honor the A.A. singleness of purpose tradition, the new Fellowship recognized that freedom from cocaine and all other mind-altering substances was their unifying element. Who we are today as the Cocaine Anonymous Fellowship, is simply the result of service.

However, service requires addicts to sacrifice in the interest of others. Without the destruction of self through recovery, sacrifice in the interest of others can be challenging. “So cooperate; never criticize. To be helpful is our only aim.” (*Big Book*, p. 89) This straightforward sentence is a guiding principle to 12th-Step service. It is a useful instruction for all levels of service. From home group members discussing changes to their meeting format, to GSRs exchanging ideas at an area meeting, to Delegates debating a motion on the floor at the Conference, self-interests come into potential conflict. When these conflicting self-interests are expressed out of fear, character defects are activated

and progress in pursuit of our common purpose is hindered.

None of us are immune to this challenge. I am grateful for my sponsor. He continually reminds me that the point is spiritual progress. Therefore, when I find myself disturbed or agitated, I am reminded of the 10th Step spiritual law “that every time we are disturbed, no matter what the cause, there is something wrong *with us*. If somebody hurts us and we are sore, we are in the wrong also” (*Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions*, p. 90). Service gives me many opportunities to grow spiritually since it also gives me many opportunities to be disturbed. I have found ‘cooperate, never criticize; to be helpful is our only aim’ to be an effective and soothing mantra. For a while now I’ve used it in my morning meditation. I sometimes will softly breathe while reciting the mantra to myself during heated debates in service meetings. Always, my anxieties disappear and I am able to understand the issue being discussed more clearly. [*Continued on page 2*]

Quote (optional): Choose a sentence or two from literature approved for use at C.A. meetings (C.A.'s meeting format, pamphlets, HFC or HFC II; A.A.'s Big Book, 12 & 12 or Service Manual). Please cite the source so we can verify the quote. If you choose not to select a quote and your submission is chosen for publication, the committee will find an appropriate quote.

Personal experience (mandatory; this is the part we need you to write!): Focus on the C.A. message of recovery. Share how you apply the Steps & Traditions in your daily life; how you communicate with the Higher Power of your understanding; an experience you found particularly uplifting or powerful; a solution to an issue or character defect you've dealt with, etc. Don't worry about grammar, spelling or punctuation; we have people to help 'polish' whatever you write.

Thought for the Day (optional): Close with a thought to ponder in meditation and/or throughout the day. If you choose not to add a thought for the day and your submission is chosen for publication, the committee will write something appropriate to accompany your personal experience.

Other than cited quotes, each submission must be the author's original writing. Length should be approximately 250 words or less.

In keeping with the 11th Tradition, submissions will be reviewed anonymously and the authors of meditations ultimately selected for the book will be asked to maintain their anonymity. Replies will be sent when the selection process is complete.

Online submissions are preferred. **Each submission also requires a properly executed release** (please use the online submission form available at www.ca.org or the form on page 8). 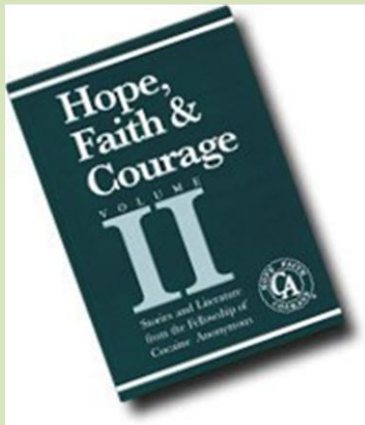

The First CAWS Convention

On May 3, 1985, hundreds of recovering addicts converged on a beachfront hotel in Santa Barbara, California, to attend the first annual World Service Convention. It was called the Seaside Unity and Acceptance Convention, but was much, much more than that. Voices from the phone and names from letters were taking form. Faces of old friends we had not as yet met appeared there before us. From coast to coast we came—excited, curious and filled with an energy that was to become our trademark.

In a crowded room on a Saturday morning, the diligent chairperson of World Services cautiously called to order the first national business meeting. After a passionate exchange of ideas, which set the format for future conferences, the meeting came to a close with a remarkable feeling of optimism.

That night we gathered together in the hotel's banquet hall to feast and celebrate our new Fellowship. Men and women who had only recently graced bathrooms, prisons, mental wards, and treatment centers were now seated in this balloon-filled majestic room, shoulder-to-shoulder, looking and feeling alive and well. The speaker was inspiring to our already high-spirited group. Banquet food even seemed to taste good that night. The first chairperson, and my partner and I were recognized that evening as C.A.'s first Trustees. This recognition somehow represented to us, and to those present, the spiritual connection and acceptance of what was, and what could be in the future. The highlight of the evening was the state-by-state countdown. One by one, each participating state was announced. Its representatives rose to the cheers and applause that grew to a fevered pitch, as voices cried out: "Alaska, Arizona, California, Connecticut, District of Columbia, Georgia, Hawaii, Illinois, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, Washington, and Wisconsin."

In the years since that convention, C.A. has spread its message and enthusiasm throughout the United States, beyond the border to Canada, and across the Atlantic Ocean to Europe.

Are We Ready? Can We Recover?

The new era for Cocaine Anonymous—are we ready for it? If “ready” means that we have seen the future and have answered all the questions, then I’m guessing we’re not. If “ready” means we have considered the possibilities and we are trying to apply our Traditions and principles to the future of C.A., then the answer is YES!

Getting sober in 1993 does not qualify me to speak of the early days of our Fellowship, but I can only imagine the excitement that surrounded the initial growth of our Fellowship. How amazing every step of the way must have been for them. How scary every decision and action must have been—and how rewarding the results must have been as well. Could they even have dreamt what C.A. is today and will be in the future?

As the Fellowship grew and required changes and advancement of our ability to reach the addict who still suffers, I find myself eternally grateful to those who stayed the course and built this foundation of a Fellowship for us—the men and women that figured out the “how” when it came to literature, organization and purpose.

I was six years sober when I served on my first CAWS World Convention Committee (CAWS 2000 in Scottsdale). In the last two and a half years of being blessed with the role of Trustee for the Southwest Region, I have also served on the CAWS 2011 Convention Committee. An unbelievable amount of changes have happened in the last eleven years. The face of C.A. and the needs of C.A. are different today and yet they seem to remain unchanged.

The contrast between the views, ideas and concerns regarding the two conventions was widely diverse, yet intensely the same. New ideas as to how to better serve our growing Fellowship were energetically brought forward and new avenues were explored to assist in carrying our message to the addict who still suffers. Some of those ideas made their way into the event and are becoming commonplace in our Fellowship's efforts. Not all of the ideas were implemented immediately, but will find their way to referrals and suggestions for consideration of the conference and future conventions. Some of the ideas didn't fit inside our Fellowship's structure or Traditions and were lovingly set aside. Language barriers and solutions, internet media, attraction of the newcomer of all ages, and international/worldwide participation as the norm excited and energized our committee.

Fiscal responsibility, commitment to the message of Cocaine Anonymous, traditional avenues of speakers, marathon meetings and quality workshops still dominate the baseline behind it all. The commitment to the Steps, Traditions and principles still rings true as much today as ever—and always, always, always create an environment to have a good time.

So as much has changed over the years and as diverse our new issues may be, the application of C.A.'s values and primary purpose still stands like a rock. Maybe that's the beauty of it all and therefore gives us our answer to the question “Are we ready? Can we recover?” YES we can!

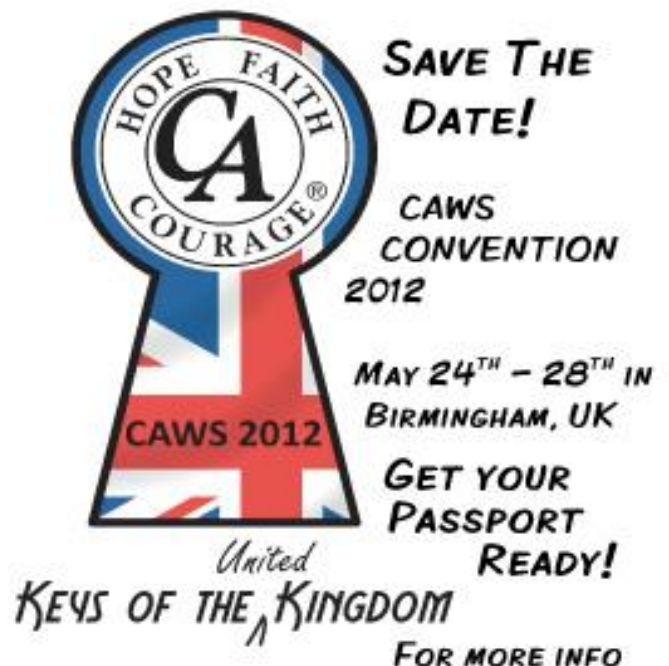
