I said I knew some of Robert's Rules Order. but was not that of knowledgeable of all of the intricacies of Robert's Rules of Order. I was, however, willing learn anything I didn't know. I didn't realize that they were talking about taking over right then at that conference! The Chair position had been vacated and Amy B., the current Parliamentarian was voted in as the Conference Chair. I gave my qualifications to the Conference floor and they voted me in anyway. I was blessed with a great Chair and a wonderful Conference Committee Chair. Meredith. The Conference went well and I only had to help the Chair with a couple difficult situations. The next year, it was my turn as Conference Chair and I was ready. Some funny things happened along the way, though. I had a bad attack of hives that August and had to start taking medication for them - I was just that nervous! When I arrived at the Conference. I had a temperature of 101, which I had the entire time (believe me, there was no partying for me at the beach). Once again God gave me two angels - a personal nurse who took care of me during the Conference and a wonderful Parliamentarian in Heidi J. The Conference went great and we actually finished early.

I was then elected to the WSBT to represent the Midwest region. C.A. at the time was in the red financially, I knew we had a lot of work to do, budgets were cut and that didn't go over well with the Trustees

but it had to be done. My fourth year on the WSBT, I was voted in as the Chair of the WSBT. My final year was wonderful, with the diligent work from the World Service Office Board, the WSBT and the Fellowship of Cocaine Anonymous; C.A. was financially back in the black.

I rotated off the WSBT and went home where my sponsor told me I could no longer do service work other than make coffee for my home group and work with my sponsees. While I was sitting around being an elder statesman I noticed my home group (the oldest C.A. meeting in Ohio) couldn't get a GSR. Knowing the importance of representation I felt compelled to not let that continue. I went back to the District as the GSR for my home group. I could not understand why others did not want to step up when the pleasure of service work was so rewarding for me. After a couple years of being GSR, the District Chair position became available and no one was interested. I talked to my sponsor and he suggested I take the position in order to train others until someone else felt ready. At this time, I am still the Chair but I don't expect that will last much longer.

I have enjoyed life on life's terms. I've been able to retire from my job. I've had the chance to do some "pleasure" travel both for C.A. and for just myself. While I began to plan a celebration for 25 years of sobriety I was diagnosed with cancer. Thank goodness I have a relationship with a Higher Power and turned my cancer problem over to Him. It has been two years now and I am cancer free! I have the opportunity to spend more time with my family, my parents, my children and my four granddaughters the youngest of which is three (I told my youngest son we need a boy)

As I was taught, this is Gods' deal and it will survive without me. I need to step back and allow the eager and bright minds of our newer members to pick up the torch.




2014 CAWS Convention Chair

In 1985, the very first CAWS Convention was held in Santa Barbara California, it's primary purpose was to promote enthusiasm and unity within a rapidly growing fellowship of Cocaine Anonymous and to financially support World Services' effort to carry the message to the addict that still suffers. Since that time Cocaine Anonymous has blossomed into an amazing fellowship of recovering addicts, both men and women from all around the world.

I got sober August 21, 1987 after visiting a couple of H&I panel meetings where the message was first carried to me, I walked into my very first meeting of Cocaine Anonymous on a Wednesday night, the "Love and Tolerance" meeting on Vinland Street in the San Fernando Valley. My first Sponsor Lee A, was on fire for C.A. and taught me first off that "working the steps and being of service are what we do around here." I began by setting up that meeting which at the time was no big deal only about fifteen or so chairs but shortly after I started that commitment the meeting began to grow and moved to another location which soon became the largest meeting in the San Fernando Valley. I was setting up about one hundred or so chairs every Wednesday night for about six months, more importantly, I was meeting a lot of people (just like me) who were being of service, and staying sober. I've had a lot of fun through the years and have had the opportunity to meet some wonderful people as a direct result of staying sober, working the steps and being of service, including my wife Maria who was the coffee person at that first C.A. meeting, (We now trudge the road to happy destiny together).

However something amazing happened to me earlier this month while attending Celebrate Around the World in our Area. I, for the first time in almost two years, was concentrated on the cards I was playing, the food I was stuffing down my throat and the wonderful, kind, loving people I was surrounded by. Sitting at my chair I was not possessed by thoughts of what I was going to do the next day, week or year. I was living in the now and it was the most freeing moment I have experienced in my sobriety.

Do You VoIP?

Do you VoIP? Do you even know what VoIP is? It stands for 'voice over internet protocol' and it is a process by which you can use your computer as a phone. VoIP calls can be audio only or a combination of audio/video, depending on how many people are participating in the call and the program being used. Now, I'm not a techno-geek and I'm not going to pretend I even understand all the uses and aspects of VoIP. That is not my purpose in writing this article. I am writing this article is to tell you how using VoIP has expanded my recovery.

I had been hearing about the VoIP C.A. meetings for a while, but I really didn't understand what they were. Actually, using that technology initially intimidated me a bit. Thing is, I kept hearing about these really cool experiences my C.A. friends were talking about using VoIP and I wanted to be a part of those experiences.

My first experience with VoIP and Cocaine Anonymous was in November 2012. There was a very large event held in Los Angeles, CA, USA, to celebrate Cocaine Anonymous' 30th birthday. I had been hearing about this event for weeks – the planning, the speakers, the excitement - and I was bummed that I could not fly to California and be a part of the event. I had heard that some members were going to access the event through VoIP, but I didn't think too much about it. That night, I got a text from a friend telling me the event was happening now. Did I want to get patched into it? I figured, "Sure, why not try something new?"

Like anything new, it was definitely awkward at first. I got disconnected a couple times, I couldn't figure out how to turn off my microphone, I didn't understand the VoIP program, stuff like that. But then, when all the kinks got worked out, that is when the magic happened. I was able to lay on my bed in Utah and hear the speakers at the event in California. I could hear the people talking in the background. I could hear them laugh when the speaker said something funny. I could hear the emotions and excitement when they did the sobriety countdown and there was a newcomer in the room. In a way, I was a part of the event. No, it wasn't as good as being there in person, but I did get to be a part of something I normally would never have experienced.

Next I got involved with one of the weekly VoIP C.A. meetings. Again, it was awkward at first. I couldn't figure out the microphone thing again and sharing with the group was a bit odd at first as I couldn't see their faces. But, they helped me through the learning curve and I got more experience with the software program the meeting uses. I am currently on a work schedule that makes it very difficult to attend face-to-face meetings. The VoIP C.A. meetings are currently a very important part of keeping me connected to the Fellowship. There is one VoIP meeting based out of the UK that happens on Saturdays at 2:00 AM MT. I use my smart phone to patch into that meeting as I'm leaving work, listen to the meeting on speaker phone as I'm driving home, and then listen and participate in the remainder of the meeting at my home.

This April, I was able to patch into a global C.A. event where VoIP was an integral part of the event. There were groups of people in Scotland, Sweden, Russia and the UK as well as Florida, Arizona & Southern California. Each of these areas was using a video camera so we all could see the readers and the speakers using VoIP. I was not in any of these geographic locations, but I was still able to participate. In May, I was able to patch into the VoIP meeting from the C.A. World Service Convention that happened in Florida. I was not able to attend that convention and I was convalescing from a sudden surgery, but I was still able to feel as if I was a part of one of the largest events that C.A. puts on every year.

Normally, I can attend plenty of face-to-face meetings to meet my recovery needs. As nice as it is to not have to leave my house sometimes to attend a meeting, I do not plan to replace all of my meetings with VoIP meetings. I like to see emotion and understanding through people's facial expressions and body language. I like to get and give hugs. I like to be physically present to help support the meetings. However, there are plenty of ways that I plan to use the VoIP meetings to keep expanding my access to Cocaine Anonymous, to keep expanding my experiences and to keep expanding my recovery. If you are having a hard time getting to face-to-face meetings in your area or if you are just looking for something new to experience, come join us in a VoIP C.A. meeting one day. Disordered

I would not comfortably suggest that life events "made me" an alcoholic or an addict, or perhaps "made me" anything, but what I did experience as the consequence of my mother dying when I was age eleven was a feeling of loss. On reflection I can now see how I was thrust into an adult perspective of the world as an unsafe place.

As a young boy or man I had no such comprehension of reality and therefore sought out other mechanisms for dealing with what I could not either understand, control, or reject immediately. Chiefly, these were alcohol and then drugs. In my urban home town we first drank as know-it-all teenagers. Under-age experimenters who would concoct cocktails as the early eighties mid-town alchemists that we were. Liquids stolen from the cabinets and the clinking shimmying bottles of wine and mirth from our parents cabinets of booze. We'd congregate out of sight at any of the nearby bushes, hideouts or hedgerows and set about drinking ourselves towards our goal - projectile vomiting. This 'Way of the Purging Sons" meant that we could somehow prove ourselves as worthy for the role of leader of the gang; at which I frequently came first of the two of us!!

Frequently resorting to deftness of hand by way of the old "five-finger-discount" more for a feeling rather than for the object of the theft. I was to be seen being arrested on a bi-monthly basis for such petty crime as; cat food, pens, yogurt, and money. I remained incrementally hopeless despite my tenacious attempts to build a structured and hope-filled life. There was no social training beyond my potential addict/alcoholic peers. We were the epitome of a blind and foolish youth in action.

Some two decades into this downward spiral finds me located in the East End of London in a high-rise condo overlooking the city-scape of a hope filled premillennium. Whacked out in as many moments of every day on a cocktail of dope, booze, petty shop-lifting, irrational lies, and a self-fulfilling prophecy that in every relationship I was born to lose. At work, I was encouraged to resign when my boss found me crying at my desk after another incident of "she had left me" – again! Now, physically dependent on morphine and with a mad obsession for stimulants; 'E', Crack,

Powders, Downers, Blotters, Hitters, Poppers, Booze and all at once please! I was given a script to taper off opiates but I was not about to taper off anything! I worked the streets for money and food. I saw an alarmingly stark vision of my destiny; toothless, gaunt, friendless, loveless - a dead man barely walking to a quicker still death. As I thought about all this I knew that I simply had to continue to drink and get high on this idea or else go insane, and so I continued this slow-death another two long years. Finally, and for the first and last time I heard the word "detox."

It helped me a great deal to learn a model of recovery that proposed addiction as a Spiritual illness. Hence when I took "spirits" into my body I somehow always felt better, whole - I mean, imagine! Wow. When I took, for example, one drink, or drug, I felt usual, or normal; better, at ease, or comfort – though in reality I felt nothing at all. Back then this was my oldest most profound deep desire. Now though, in order to live afresh, I was encouraged to find support in the community through the use of The Twelve Step Spiritual Principles, and to join the related community groups as a way of finding and helping others through the program I then had to offer them by my own experience of using it. Through this recovery process I was taught to develop a way of being in the world that saw me consider the people of this world as an interconnected family of fellows. One in which I had always been an important member, but simply hadn't known until I came home by the revelation of a refreshed view of my experiences from outside of myself. In this family I found access to a New Power. From this tentative beginning I was able to learn resilience, trust, integrity and perseverance, and to become a survivor of a war. A war that was only one I had ever been involved in – the war with myself.

Seven years later I am a husband, a colleague, a mentor, a student, a teacher, a fellow, a brother, a son, a speaker, a seeker, a child, and my new hope is to be a parent. I am often asked what was the difference that enabled me to change where many simply die, like my brother? Why have I recovered where so many continue on, even when knowing that to keep drinking and drugging is to make the ultimate sacrifice on this one precious and short life? Today, this very day while

writing, I would say that my blessing is that I was finally made consciously aware, by the fullest realization of the depth of my suffering, of how deeply I was, and had always been, enslaved. This was "The Key." But also, not only that I wanted to stop was crucial, but also that I had a profound desire for a completely whole "New Way of Life." I am now absolutely assured that this has been the profound and Universal gift of Love.

Today I am free human wherever I might be in the Universe. I have been simply unchained to be the best version of myself I have been. I hope that sounds attractive to those who are still in chains and who know it. This brief and beautiful life is both joy and pain and' has been a route to freedom. From within this notion I have been given a way of accessing a lasting joy through all or any experience. I am able to allow myself to be okay with whatever is and not rush to be where I would rather be (def: dis-ease – 'away from'). From where I now stand even the small-deaths of the each and everyday can all give birth to "The New," or "Next Experience." In the first half of this the same life I became a slave who I can now see was climbing up the wrong ladder for his happiness. The most sincere act of gratitude that I must remember is to thank this Universe that when I fell from the top back to the bottom of the rickety old ladder of a miss-spent youth, through the terrifying awareness and my admittance of the fall I was finally set free.

I recently celebrated 25 years clean and sober, and I believe doing Service has helped to keep me sober over the past number of years. I thank God for this commitment.

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

LIFE AFTER SERVICE

"We discovered that the best way to serve God was to serve our fellow humans, and we found humility in the process. Our self-centered behavior was gradually replaced with the "attitude of service." We learned that service is about gratitude and learning how to contribute to our lives and the lives of others.

- Why Be of Service?
 - · To give back what was so freely given to us
 - · To take on a commitment as a symbolic way of making amends
 - · To meet other recovering addicts
 - · To learn how to be part of a team
 - · To learn humility by doing something selfless for someone else
 - · To learn skills or teach others what we know
 - · To learn responsibility"

(Quote from C.A. Pamphlet: Being of Service)

The very thought of stepping away and sitting at "the back" screamed wrong in my mind. From the day I came into the Fellowship the word was and still is "step up and do service we need you." We even have a pamphlet entitled "Being of Service."

I seem to have benefitted most from being of service to others: this will be a great mystery to some! A long time ago an older member guided me to a passage from *The Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions* of A.A. this passage speaks about what eminent doctors thought of alcoholics in recovery: page 127 (U.K. Version) says:"...most of the alcoholics under investigation were still childish, emotionally sensitive and grandiose."

Well there is something my sponsor might say "imagine that" and we all think we are so grounded especially after all those people we have helped. It sums it up really, we still think we need praise, feel slighted if not acknowledged and imagine we are saving the world. What we are is being of service to others so we don't use and die – that's what's going on here; nothing more nothing less! In the act of helping others we do in fact save ourselves.

For almost two decades I have tried to help others in various ways and eventually found myself on the C.A. World Service Board of Trustees a few years ago. I have since rotated out and I then reached out to my

sponsor and members who had done similar service. They all suggested sitting at the back! This almost sounded like heresy where I come from – "what?! and do nothing" I cried? However this was to not to be the case as certain traditions came into play and my life took on a new meaning; this ego had to go again. So yes of course I do service but not the upfront variety. My sponsor directed me, and I did as directed - it was really that simple. There is no end to service: the journey, the landscape and the people differ this is my experience. Why would I stop? Gratitude at a base level is surely the simple fact that I acknowledge I have been helped and to maintain this feeling I must give back. For me, my role is to serve – no other. This is the how and the why of it. What I chose to do today and everyday are the things I can, the rest I leave to the one who has all power and that one is God.

So today when "not" doing service, I put chairs out, help newcomers out with literature, help count the money, facilitate my home group if asked, try to share about the program and not just myself. Sponsorship continues to help me but the new people think it helps them and listening (to others) has become the new talking (about myself). Extra cash in the pot can help a group, and sharing my experience of service when asked to so, is also Service.

The last part of Step 12 states "...and to practice these principles in all our affairs." I take this to mean "apply all this stuff I have learned in the Fellowship and bring it with me where ever I go." This is a big ask; but the key word in Step 12 is "tried" and how do we do this in our daily lives on a practical level. Putting into practice what I have learned can be tricky but it is possible. Judge not one bit, stay neutral, be closed mouthed about stuff and an old favorite "can I object without being objectionable?" Working as a team member all these years in committees has honed some skills and others I am still working on. This is a job for life - not just one for Cocaine Anonymous business.

I love "Life After Service" not doing so much I could not have wished for a better life!


